
How Carma Came to Our Family




Bella was extremely gentle with her Yorkie siblings, all of the other dogs at doggy daycare, and had a healthy respect for cats! She actually avoided them because of an incident with my daughter's cat when she was a puppy. She was also tolerant of my photo shoots. Bella would let me do anything in the world to her such as trim her nails or put her in the shower even though I knew that she did not like it. She trusted me completely and I trusted her with my children, even though my mother did not when I first got Bella. She, like many, feared that the breed was unpredictable and that she might hurt my children. Later, my mother would become one of Bella's biggest fans and could not imagine ever fearing this sweet soul.





Bella, my favorite hiking partner was a constant in my life for 13 precious years. Anytime that she got ahead of me on the trail, she would always look back before she got too far to make sure I was still there. She was there during some very difficult times and some wonderful times too. Too often we take the presence of man's or woman's best friend for granted.







In Nov. 2020, Bella, passed away after a very brief and sudden illness. She was at peace and surrounded by people that loved her. Keith, my son, and my daughter were all present while I stroked her and said goodbye as she laid on her heated bed covered in Keith's wool blanket. She had what most would consider the perfect death. I was devastated. I grieved over losing her like I have never grieved over any human as bad as that may sound. It is still very hard.

Bella was my sweetest hello and my most difficult goodbye. She is greatly missed but will forever be loved and remembered.



Keith, being the compassionate husband that he is, wanted to help ease my suffering. He contacted Mike Work, the handler that showed his Basenji's many years prior, for a recommendation for a reputable breeder of a Pitbull or bully type breed. Mike suggested that Keith contact Amanda Shea of Sheaman Kennels in Ware, MA. Keith reached out and Amanda was expecting a litter in November of Staffordshire Bull Terriers. In November 2020, the same month that Bella passed away, the November 9 Litter was born. I told Keith that I just wanted a fat little puppy to love, but part of the deal was that we would make an effort to show her and try to get her championship. I did not have any experience with the dog show world. In fact, I had never even been to a dog show! But, I NEEDED a dog in our home.





Amanda Shea began sending us pictures of these sweet little puppies with fat bellies and the next thing we knew, we were planning a trip to Massachusetts. We didn't take our Christmas tree down until we brought this little present home because we wanted to celebrate with her.





In January 2021, we flew to Massachusetts to pick up Carma. She was indeed a fat little puppy, and had our hearts from the moment we picked her up. I did not want to put her on a plane and risk her being separated from us or having some type of complication so we rented a vehicle to drive back home to Tennessee with our precious cargo! I convinced Keith it would be fun and that a long road trip would allow us the opportunity to spend time with Carma and get to know her better before returning home.





Father's Day Trip Franklin, NC














The girls are all dressed up for Mom's Surprise 50th Birthday Party at the office. Carma is hoping that someone will drop some cake.






Carma and Luna are such good helpers. They are helping me pack up stuff for a move.




Halloween 2021






Dogs give so much love to those around them, and they deserve to enjoy healthy, happy lives filled with lots of love themselves. It is our responsibility as owners to properly care for our canine companions which includes teaching them good manners, how to behave as respectful family members and how to be good citizens. This is particularly important for powerful breeds and especially bully breeds because of the stigma that has been unfairly attached to them as vicious dogs that cannot be trusted. Bully breed is a generic umbrella term for terrier-type dogs including the American Staffordshire Terrier, the Pit Bull Terrier, the American Bulldog, Boston Terriers, Boxers, Bull Terriers, and Mastiffs just to name a few.

Many states and countries have passed breed specific legislation that bans bully and other powerful breeds. The laws are designed to reduce dog attacks on humans or other animals and promote public safety. However, these laws have been shown to compromise rather than enhance public safety. Breed specific legislation has been shown to be costly and ineffective in stopping vicious attacks or reducing the incidence of dog bites. They promote prejudice and canine discrimination which contributes to the high percentage of bully breeds in shelters and sadly a staggering number of bullies euthanized each year. The Centers for Disease Control strongly opposes breed specific laws and have noted that other factors beyond breed affect a dogs tendency towards aggression such as: heredity, socialization and training, reproductive status and early experiences. Dog ownership should not be taken lightly and should be viewed as a lifetime commitment to love and care for a dog. Unfortunately, not all dog owners are responsible and fail to provide proper training and socialization that dogs so desperately need in order to gain confidence, develop trust, and to become good citizens.


Prospective pet parents should learn as much as they can about each dog's specific breed traits to ensure that they are capable of providing the dog with the activity, grooming, and lifestyle requirements needed to develop into a happy well balanced dog before bringing a dog into their home

The Staffordshire Bull Terrier or Staffy as they are affectionally known is one of only 3 dog breeds recognized by both the AKC and UKC. The only thing bigger than their smile is their heart. Staffies are smart, athletic, and love nothing more that being with those they love. Staffies learn quickly and respond best to positive reinforcement when training. They can be goofy and are very sensitive making them a loving and fun companion. Staffies require a good amount of attention and would not do well in a home where they are left outside or alone. They are short haired dogs with minimal grooming requirements.





It is extremely important to give dogs the opportunity to socialize with many different people and age groups when they are puppies. Adults and children behave very differently. If a dog has not had the opportunity to be around younger children that may be louder, impulsive, and display unpredictable behavior, the dog may become nervous or fearful. A fearful dog is more likely to bite or act aggressively in order to protect itself or his owner. Exposure to people of different ages, genders and ethnicities as well as different environments will help to build confidence and trust in dogs and make life more pleasurable for the both the dog and the owner. Dog ownership is one of the greatest pleasures in life and also one of the greatest responsibilities which should never be taken lightly.
